

St Joe Flies

Rumor has it that cutthroat trout are not too smart but remember they can learn when pounded daily with flies from eager fisherman. Some of the fly "favorites" that have been mentioned to me are:

Large attractor patterns: Chernoble Ants, other foam flies with large hackles and lots of color; Sofa Pillows; **Dry Flies:** Adams, Bear Paws (about the only fly that Dave and Sharon use) Humpy's, Royal Wulff's, Blue Wing Olives, and Caddis.

Nymphs: Some (like John Read and others) sneak up on fish using a nymph dropper from a large attractor fly. They say that the attractor fly brings the fish up for a look and a refusal, then the fish see the nymph and say "I' think I'll take that". Almost sounds unfair! As the fishing gets tougher later in the season and on bright days use **nymphs** (Hare's Ear, Pheasant Tail, etc.) on the bottom and go to **smaller** sizes of dry flies (18 to 24).

Don't pass up the riffles-they hold a surprising number of fish. Enjoy!
