

**Bull Trout Redd Counts, Sept** 18, 2004. The CFC were represented by Debbie Bell, Cliff Swanson, and Glen Murray during the Bull Trout Redd count activity.

About thirty people from the Forest Service, CFC, North Idaho Flycasters, IDFG, UI Fisheries Students, and other volunteers showed up in rainy cool weather to appointed. participate. Teams of three were assigned each tributary with each team led by an experienced fisheries person

Ten to twelve tributary streams to the upper St Joe. River were surveyed. Only six to eight redds were found, with Heller Creek having five or six of these redd sites. Heller Creek also has had restoration work to improve fish habitat.

A BBQ with food provided by the North Idaho Flycasters ended the days activities.

#### **Answers to Char Triva:**

(Answers From Behhke, R.J. "Trout and Salmon.")

- 1. Brook Trout, Lake Trout, Bull Trout, Arctic Char, Dolly Varden.
- 2. Splake (Brook trout X Lake trout); Tiger Trout (Brook trout X non-native Brown trout). Another hybrid exists (Brook trout X Bull Trout).
- 3. True. Optimum range for char is 50 to 57 degrees F. compared to trout and salmon with about 57 to 65 F. Brook trout is more tolerant of warm water than the other char.

#### P.T. BRASSIE

Fish this nymph in either river eddies, riffles or lakes, either alone or under a strike indicator. Let the fly sink, use a slow hand twist retrieve and then let it sink again. This nymph gains depth quickly.

- 1. Tie in brass wire beginning one eye width behind the eye on your side of the hook and wind the thread back to the bend. Lay the extra wire over the top of the hook and let it hang.
- 2. Tie in Pheasant Tail (PT) in front of the "lay over" wire and wind thread back till the tail tips up.
- 3. Wind thread forward keeping the PT on top of the hook, take the thread to the eye, covering the PT. The PT is now sticking straight out the front of the hook.
- 4. Wind the wire in touching turns to just shy of the eye, wrap back to 1/3rd shank length back from the eye and then forward to front of the hook. Break wire by circling to give smooth break end.
- 5. Wingcase. Take the PT and pull it back on itself, so it will be a bit longer than the thorax when pulled back. Secure folded PT with a thread wrap, and then pull the PT butts forward and secure with another thread wrap behind the eye. This gives three layers of pheasant tail for the wingcase.

  Tail,
- 6. Dub thorax and leave thread at the rear of the thorax. .
- 7. Pull the tripled PT over the thorax and tie off at the rear of the thorax. Change the thread color now to Fire Orange. It is a "key-on" spot for the fish. Trim the butts of the PT close to the thread. Whip finish over the tie down point.
- 8. Strengthen the wingcase and thread with head cement. Coating the wire abdomen with cement gives it a translucent look if you are using un-varnished wire.



#### Materials:

**Hook**: Standard nymph,

sizes 14-18

Thread: Fire Orange or White,

Uni-thread 8/0

**Body**: About 0.012-inch

brass or copper wire 5-6 Pheasant Tail Fibers

Wingcase

Thorax: Spiky dubbing to suit,

like squirrel or hares

ear.

**Note:** This fly has been especially effective for catching fish in heavily fished

waters.
