

Speaker/Alspach-Engerbretson Scholarship Winner. Jim Yanke, A UI Fisheries Student is the recipient of this scholarship in 2005. He gave a presentation on his thesis work on the effect of water temperature, and PIT tagging on survival of fall Chinook salmon on the Snake River. Temperatures above 20C were detrimental to survival of salmon smolts. PIT tagging was not detrimental to survival. Physiological measurements show that tissue damage is occurring at temperatures warmer than 20C.

The day started with a chill but finished with warm sunshine. The third was an August trip to the N. Fork or the Clearwater. We spent the day catching cutthroats and rainbows in the cooler portions of the main stem and exploring the cool confines of the feeder tributaries. Even a broken rod didn't put a damper on the fine lunch and good fellowship Don provided. A bit of duct tape and the splinted 3 wt finished out a great day of fishing!

The cut came on a black woolly worm with a silver ribbing. The light was just right to see the fly during the whole retrieve. One moment there was just the fly and in the next moment there was the flash of silver as the trout came out of the dark water to hit the fly. To this day that encounter is still my most vivid fishing experience. I don't think you can find a prettier fish anywhere than a wild coastal cutthroat.

Beadhead Midge

Midge (chironomid) pupa or larva imitations are all over the world and in all kinds of water. Lakes and slow water streams abound with them. Usually species that hatch in the winter are tiny, but the spring and summer species are larger. Harold Patterson of Foster City, California tied this pattern at the 39th International Fly Fishing Show and Conclave in Idaho Falls, ID, August 2003.

Red has been a popular color since anglers years ago found red chironomid larva. It is the color of larva that live oxygen poor environments such as bottom mud and debris. They have extra hemoglobin, which makes them red. Other colors are also seen so keep a sharp lookout for bugs in your waters. Check the debris that clings to your anchor; there is a lot of information to be gained there.

How is a pattern like this fished? Two techniques may be used. One, use a strike indicator with enough tippet, fluorocarbon works great, to let the Bead Head Midge hang near the bottom or weeds. Try different depths or fly if no action.

For dredging select a slow to fast sinking line or sink tip line to reach the depth you wish to fish. Shorten the leader to 4 or 5 feet. Cast, let it sink and then start a retrieve. A slow hand twist retrieve is recommended because chironomid pupa move slowly.

Think thin when tying this fly, as these flies have a slender profile.



Materials

Hook: R30 #12-14 **Bead**: Brass, 3/32-inch

Thread: 8/0 Red

Gills: CDC puff, white Rib: Tinsel, very fine silver

or Crystal Flash, pearl-

escent

Body: Superfloss, red **Collar**: Peacock herl
