Glenn Woodhouse Profile by Glen Murray

Glenn Woodhouse moved to Pullman in the fall of 2002. Currently he, wife Debbie, daughter Katherine, son Sam, and an assortment of goats, sheep, chickens, and a pony reside near Colfax on 16 acres. Prior to arrival in Washington State, Glenn and family lived in Boise for 14 years, where he worked for Micron Technology and affiliated companies as a Process Engineer and Engineering Manager, a similar job that he also now holds with Schweitzer Engineering Laboratories (SEL) in Pullman. The teams he manages support the research and development of new products through providing design for manufacturing input, facilitating the building of prototype systems, and supporting the transition of new products into volume manufacturing.



Glenn has been a member of CFC for about two years and is currently serving as Vice-President. Glenn regularly attends CFC meetings and has participated in the Amber Lake and St. Joe fishouts. He has also developed a new strategy for our monthly raffle, which includes purchase of additional raffle items by the club to augment member donations, and a drawing at the end of the year for a new custom built fly rod of the winner's choice.

As a youth, Glenn began fishing as a spin fisherman in streams and rivers near his home in Western Washington for rainbows, sea run cutthroat, and steelhead. He got into fly fishing in the late 70's after his enthusiasm for whitewater rafting put him places such as the Deschuttes River in Oregon, where anglers were catching big trout on flies. His favorite places to fish are on moving water, particularly rivers to float fish with the "Trout Scow", a large whitewater raft adapted to make fishing from as effective and comfortable as possible (read big cooler!). Trout are his favorite fish with no clear favorites between rainbows, browns, or cutthroats. If not trying to "match-the-hatch", Glenn's three favorite flies include Elk Hair Caddis, Bead head Hares-ear, and Parachute Adams.

Not one to dwell in the past, his favorite fishing memory is as far away as the next fishing trip, but at the St. Joe Fishout in 2005, a particularly memorable event occurred as his daughter, Katherine, then 8, and son Sam, then 5, both caught their first fish on flies. His wife also fishes and the entire family, including the dog, have been seen at Amber Lake fishing from their floating fortress.

In addition to fly fishing, Glenn's currently active hobbies include fly tying, rod building, skiing, and camping with a long history of climbing, running, whitewater kayaking and rafting, and automotive pursuits. Family activity and duties associated with being a "Gentleman Farmer", along with job responsibilities currently take much of his time not devoted to fly fishing.

Glenn was born in Whittier, California but moved with his family to Vancouver, WA when he was five. In addition to his residences in Washington State, his jobs have also taken him and his family to Belgium for a year and a half, a stint in North Carolina, and a solo three months in Malaysia. He considers himself a Northwesterner and is looking forward to participation in future conservation efforts of CFC and unlocking more of the West's whitewater fishing treasures.

October Speaker Dan Landeen

Dan Landeen is a resident of Clarkston, Washington and is employed by the Nez Perce Indian Tribe as a wildlife biologist. Most of his work for the Tribe is conducted at the US Department of Energy's Hanford Site in eastern Washington. Dan represents the tribe at the site on cleanup issues and ensuring that natural resources are protected as that land is being cleaned up.

Dan's hobbies include bamboo fly rod building, backpacking, flyfishing, and photography. He is also the principal author of two books, *I Am of This Land: Wildlife of the Hanford Site and Salmon and His People: Fish and Fishing in Nez Perce Culture.*

He is also the sole author of *Steelhead Fly Fishing Nez Perce Country: Snake River Tributaries, Rivers, Anglers, Flies, Origins* which was published by Frank Amato Publishing this April.



Dan Landeen's unique book chronicles the history of Steelhead flyfishing in Chief Joseph country on three of America's most storied rivers: The Grande Ronde, the Clearwater, and the Snake. For thousands of years, these rivers produced an amazing and bountiful subsistence fishery for the Nez Perce and other indigenous peoples in one of the most rugged and remote regions of North America. It was not, in fact, until the twentieth century that fly fishers "discovered" the area. Through interviews with over thirty master fly fishers, including local legends like Bob Wedell, Keith Stonebraker, Terry Nab, LeRoy Hyatt, and Craig Lannigan, the author teases out the story of the fabled runs before and after the crowds and the dams on the mainstem Columbia and lower Snake decimated the wild fishery. Former Idaho Fish and Game biologist Steve Pettit provides an excellent overview of Steelhead politics and biology on the Clearwater from the early 1970s forward, and the late Jimmy Green gives a fascinating account of how he came to build his famous two-handed rod. Over thirty anglers tell their own stories of memorable places, memorable fish, and memorable people, including mentors like Wes Drain, Enos Bradner, Lee Wulf, Bill Schadt, and Ted Trueblood. Dozens of historic and contemporary photographs amplify the interviews. Among other things, the photos show us each master in his own element along with a favorite fly. Reading this book will renew every angler's appreciation for our natural resources and how fast things can change across the space of a few years.

He especially enjoys taking pictures and panoramas of the local region. Many of his photos are taken on flyfishing trips to such places as the North Fork, Lochsa, and Selway rivers. He also has a good working knowledge of Photoshop which enables him to enhance photos or add artistic effects. Dan also reproduces art work, and restores and retouches old, damaged or faded photos.






Tying tip for getting the correct height on the wing of a humpy.

Before tying your humpy take a moment and study these proportions as depicted in the illustrations. An understanding will help you do your best in reproducing well proportioned patterns. I ran across this article several years ago and use it each time I tie humpies.

h = hackle and barb length w = wing length t = tail length $t_1 = tail$ tie down area g = gape of hook (known factor) s = shank of hook b = body length b/w = length of body, hump and wing hair w = 2g t = s b/w = 2s $t_1 = 1/2$ s $s_1 = 1/2$ s
