Shauna Hillman to speak at the November meeting

Shauna Hillman of Wallace, Idaho, took up the art of fly fishing in 1979 at the age of 25, bring what she calls a 12-year old's curiosity to the sport, and three years later, when the price of store bought flies got up to 85 cents and she was tired of them falling apart too quickly, she tied her first fly.

A book learned tier, Shauna started tying flies commercially in 1990 and in 1993 formed the Fly of the Month Club, and with about 50 on her mailing list, an activity she continues today.

Says Shauna: I wanted to learn a sport that I could follow and practice for the whole of my life. Fly-fishing gives me the opportunity to see beautiful countryside, amazing waterfalls, and interesting people, and fantastic fishin' holes. The vast amount of fly and fishing literature tickles my imagination. The sport compliments many other outdoor activities as well, such as hiking and mountain biking. There are a few more exciting moments in life than a perfect cast, a perfect hook set in an 18 inch cutthroat, with a fly tied by yourself.

Shauna spends hours each week pouring over fly literature in search of new tiers and new ideas as well as attempting to learn more about the great tiers of history and their flies.

Shauna's theory is that there are 100 million different flies in the world and we fish with two of them: The adams and a renegade. So she reads and researches flies and aquatic insects monthly to find a fly for the members of the Fly of the Month Club. Shauna ties the flies and writes a narrative the covers where the fly originated, the tier, the technique for fishing, and any tricks that might be necessary to a quality and long lived fly. Her goals are to tie a quality-fishing fly that will endure numerous casts, and to tie flies from the great tiers of history, keeping them alive in the annuals of fly-fishing.

Shauna Hillman graduated from South Fremont High School in St. Anthony, Idaho on the Henry's Fork of the Snake River, where she returned to fish at the age of 28. She holds a B.A. in Photographic Journalism from Idaho State University in Pocatello, and returned there to fish the Portneuf River in her 30's. After studying black and white photography under Benedict Fernandez in Paris in 1989, she opened an archival photographic shop in Wallace, Idaho in 1992. She ties flies in her studio every Wednesday afternoon. She is a past Elks Citizen of the year and Wallace Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year. However she says her highest honor is when she is asked to appear as Smokey Bear in one of Wallace's annual parades.

FLY OF THE MONTH CRIPPLED MAYFLY

Hook - Light wire dry-fly style Thread - Fine, to match color of fly

Tail - Several hackle fibers - color to match Body - Your favorite dubbing- color to match

Wing - Crinkled A-Ion - color to match

Thorax - Same as body



Carefully bend the hook, by thirds or used a curved nymph hook. Tie a hackle fiber tail the same length as the hook shank. Then dub a tapered body about 2/3 of the way up the hook. Tin in the crinkled Z-Ion diagonally to the right of the hook shank. This will cause it to lie flat on the water instead of riding upright. Tie in the hackle right behind the wing and secure. Dub a wrap of thorax behind the wing and another one or two in front of the wing and secure. Wind the hackle one turn behind the wing and three turns in front. Tie off and secure. Make a small head, whip finish, and cement. Finally trim the hackle flush with the bottom of the fly.
