"Trails to Trout" - Rich Landers

Either way, the author of the guidebook "100 Hikes in the Inland Northwest" will present an armchair tour on how he satisfies both passions in some of the region's most spectacular backcountry settings.

Rich Landers, a native Montanan, has focused his outdoor pursuits around the Inland Northwest since becoming the Outdoors

Editor in 1977 for *The Spokesman-Review*. Landers is a contributing writer for Field & Stream magazine and has received conservation awards from the Idaho Conservation League, Washington Environmental Council, and National Audu-

bon Society. He has pedaled his bicycle across the United States, climbed peaks from Rainier to McKinley, hiked countless miles of trails in Idaho, Montana, Washington, British Columbia and beyond. He's the author of "100 Hikes in the Inland Northwest" a National Outdoor Book Awards winner - plus "Paddle Routes of the Inland Northwest" and "Paddling Washington".

Rich is married to Meredith Heick, a Moscow native and former Idaho State Junior Miss. They have two daughters.

#### **Backcast—February Meeting**

# February Speaker – Dan Landeen: "Cutthroat Fly Fishing on the North Fork of the Clearwater River"

Dan gave a great talk about fishing the North Fork region. Below is a summary of his talk.

The North Fork is comprised of a wide variety of water, and this was the traditional Nez Perce fishing and hunting area. It was primarily a salmon and steelhead river before Dworshak Dam was put in. The Native Americans used spears and traps, but they also used elk-bone hooks with grouse feathers attached.

On the North Fork, there are 80-100 miles of fishable water, usable from mid-June to November. It is best fished from shore. There are many good campgrounds, plus a number of undeveloped camp sites. Kelly Creek is a major tributary, and there are many other good ones to explore. You could see wolves, as well as many other forms of wildlife, and there are no rattlesnakes to contend with. He mentioned that the June 10 storm killed hundreds of small birds. The fish include cutthroat, bull trout, whitefish, suckers, and squawfish. Most cutthroat are 10-14 inches, many hybridized with rainbow, and most of the fish are found downriver late in the fall. There is a fall kokanee spawning run up from Dworshak Reservoir, with spawning habitat primarily in the tributaries. The cutthroat eat the spawn.

The North Fork is a difficult river to fish. Perhaps the best time is during the October Caddis hatches, say late August to mid-October. There are a wide variety of useful flies, including parachute patterns. At times, it may be best to use 18-20 size patterns, and you may need to use soft-hackle patterns.

Dan has some recommended changes to regulations on the North Fork. He thinks that there should be a slot limit of two fish in the 10-14 inch range, and that more enforcement is needed. There should be no limits on rainbow or brook trout. Motor cycles should be excluded from Weitas Creek.

#### **Steelhead Counts for Lower Granite Dam**

Good numbers of steelhead came over Lower Granite Dam this past year (most in September and October), with a slightly improved percentage of wild fish. Predictions for returns of salmon in 2009 are generally up for the Columbia River system, based on smolt returns and ocean conditions. So, we all hope that next year will be a good one for steelhead as well. Forecasts for 2009 steelhead returns are due out in June. Hook: #14-20 Tiemco 2457 (or equivalent)

Thread: 8/0 Black Uni-Thread

Body: Red and green Ultra Wire wrapped together

Wing: Small tuft of white Z-lon (or other synthetic fibers)

Thorax: Gray and green rabbit fur, mixed.
