November Program: Marika Dobos, "Habitat use and movement patterns of westslope cutthroat trout in the South Fork Clearwater River Basin"

Westslope cutthroat trout *Oncorhynchus clarki lewisi* are the most widely distributed subspecies of cutthroat trout and are a popular sport fish. Northern Idaho is a popular

destination for anglers seeking large and numerous cutthroat trout. Most systems in the Clearwater River Basin, particularly Kelly Creek and the Selway River, retain some of the more pristine streams and popular cutthroat trout fisheries, largely due to the catch-and-release regulations and minimal habitat disturbance. Despite harvest regulations and managed land use, reports from Idaho Department of Fish and Game indicate low densities and size structure of cutthroat trout in the South Fork Clearwater River.



My research focuses on investigating the status of cutthroat trout in the South Fork Clearwater River Basin. Radio telemetry and underwater observations (i.e., snorkeling) will be used to describe seasonal movement patterns, spatial and temporal distribution, habitat selection, and factors limiting cutthroat trout. Results from this research will indicate the use of important environmental factors, cause of mortality, and will influence habitat management and harvest regulations.



Marika is currently an M.S. student at the University of Idaho. In 2007, she received her B.S. in biology from Eastern Oregon University. Then, she worked several seasonal positions with the U. S. Forest Service and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) as a fisheries technician. Recently, she worked as a Fish Biologist for ODFW, researching anadromous Chinook salmon and steelhead in northeast Oregon.

Primarily, her research interests involve answering questions that influence management and conservation of native fishes. Her personal interests involve numerous outdoor activities including fishing, hunting, and hiking in the summer and fall, and snowboarding and skiing in the winter and spring. She also dabbles in painting and drawing where she focus her interests in fish and wildlife art.

Backcast to October Meeting

Guests: Scott O'Donnell, a former UI student, who has been attending our St. Joe fishouts for the past decade, and Connor Gardai, son of our members Steve and Linda Gardai and currently on furlough from the service.

Fishing Reports: Roger Willemsen had fished the North Fork Clearwater and Kelly Creek, and he reported great fishing. He and a friend caught a number of big cutts the previous week on caddis flies and midges. Paul Agidius had been on the Henry's Fork, where he caught a nice rainbow. He reported lots of small fish at Warm Springs. He and two other members just returned from fishing in the Dillon area. The fishing was reported to have been slow, but now they know more about the Beaverhead and Big Hole Rivers for future reference.

Steve Busch said the steelheading was poor on the Rhonde and Clearwater, with fish in the former but not the latter. Linda Gardai reported on their great, recent fishing trip on the Middle Fork of the Flathead River. Bruce Frazier said he spent a day on the Snake two weeks ago, and there were a few summer fish but no winter fish. He managed four fish in three days on the Lochsa River.

Dave Tharp reported amazing fishing on the St. Joe one week and then very slow a week later. He floated the Canyon Section, which was really tough. Bill Hendrix went for bass on the Snake – didn't say exactly where – used a No. 8 Wooly Bugger and even caught one slightly bigger than the fly.

Andy Kleinhofs and friends made a trip to the Lower Deschutes, where the fishing was ok but not fantastic. He and Fred Muehlbauer had made their annual Kodiak Island trip. Fred reported the fishing really good on flies, one of their best years ever, with fish up to 20 pounds.

Lynn Youngblood said he and Kay had fished recently on the Lochsa and North Fork. One day the fishing was really hot, and they caught over 30 fish. They were 10 days on the road in their "new" camper – the old one finally gave up! Five days they had rain. The other downer for Lynn seemed to be that he had to report that Kay caught most of the fish. The new camper worked well, however.

Committee Reports:

Conservation. Doug Baldwin was not present, but Paul Agidius reported that there was a talk on the suction dredging controversy scheduled for the following Thursday, sponsored by the Clearwater Basin Advisory Committee.

FFF. Steve Bush asked the members to join FFF, if they haven't done so. There is an interesting article on Yellowstone Cutthroat, where they are attempting to remove the Lake Trout that have been decimating the Cutts. In the Northwest, the gillnetting removal has been going well, with a big push from the CCA. Members should consider joining that organization as well.

Membership. Paul Agidius reminded members to pay their dues. It is the right time of year, under the new club rules.

Fly Tying. Cliff Swanson said they had met last week at Moscow Title, and that Mark Brownell was in town and stopped by to chat. They will be meeting each month during the fall and winter.

Scholarship. Cliff Swanson is distributing the information on the next round of awards to the appropriate college contacts in a timely fashion.

Program. Doug Young has Marika Dobos lined up in November to talk about her project on Westslope Cutthroat Trout. In December, Ken Cain will give a presentation on restoration of Burbot in the Kootenai River.

Treasurer. Bruce Frazier said we have about \$3800 in operating funds and \$7500 in scholarship funds. Swap with ID Game and Fish: They donated a sturgeon trip, and the club bought them a dry suit for some of their research. It was a very informative trip, as these ancient fish grow incredibly slowly, on the order of 3 cm in 5 years.

Nominations of Officers: At the end of the year, there will need to be replacements for at least four positions. Bruce and Lavon Frazier will be stepping down as Treasurer and Secretary. Body: Gold dubbing, tapered

Rib: Mono

Body hackle: Grizzly Under wing: With flash Upper wing: Dark hair Thorax: Ice dubbing, gold

Hackle: Grizzly
