April Program: Barry Cummings, Idaho Fish and Game, "Enforcements Role in Fish and Wildlife Management: A Snapshot"

Barry is an IDFG District Conservation Officer and supervises the six officers in the Lewiston district. Barry graduated from the University of Montana with a BS in wildlife biology in 2000 and while in college worked for Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks. He started working for IDFG in 2001 in southern Idaho (Idaho Falls) and moved to the Deary patrol area as a senior Conservation Officer in 2002. He also graduated from the Idaho Peace Officers Standards Training academy (POST) in 2002 and holds an advanced certificate from that academy. Barry was a field training officer prior to his promotion to District Conservation Officer in 2010. In addition to his other duties he is currently a firearms instructor and less lethal training instructor for officers in IDFG. Barry has hundreds of hours of specialized training - too much to list here. Just this past winter, Barry was hired by the University of Idaho to teach a class in wildlife law enforcement. He has been nominated for and has received several awards, including:

Missoula Exchange Club Officer of the year 1999; nominated for North America Wildlife Enforcement Officers Association (NAWEOA) "Torch Award" in 2004 and 2005; received Conservation Enforcement Officer of the year in 2005; nominated for NAWEOA Officer of the year for region 4 in 2012 and received the Shikar-Safari Wildlife Enforcement Officer of the year award for Idaho in 2012.

Program Notes:



Conor Giorgi is an MS candidate at Eastern Wahington University. He was the recipient of the Clearwater Fly Casters' 2013 Bill Alspach & Dave Engerbretson Memorial Scholarship. Conor presented results of his research completed to date in his presentation.

The anadromous fish population in many of the tributaries of the upper Wenatchee River, WA have dramatically declined. Historically Coho, Chinook, Sockeye and Steelhead were common in Nelson Creek, the Chiwawa, Little Wenatchee and White Rivers which are tributaries of the upper Wenatchee River. The reduction in the number of salmon has occurred even though the upper Wenatchee basin is a pristine wilderness area with little human impact. So the question is: 'why no salmon'?

Sampling: The white River is the only stream of the four with a self-sustaining salmon fishery (Sockeye). Conor collected numerous samples of benthic macroinvertebrates from above (upper) and below (lower) the spawning reach. He has also collected samples from Nelson Creek, the Chiwawa and Little Wenatchee Rivers which have few returning salmon. To date he has analyzed the November samples from the upper and lower reaches of the White river.

Results: Both the upper and lower reaches are dominated by mayflies. The lower reach compared to the upper reach had: fewer macroinvertebrates (83.25/ft² vs. 113.4/ft² upper reach) and lower biomass of macroinvertebrates (24.21 g/ft² vs. 33.71 g/ft² upper reach). In summary, these preliminary results indicate that the upper reach has more bugs, greater diversity and more biomass compared to the lower reach. Yet the upper reach has few salmon. This is directly opposed to the hypothesis that returning fish lead to more marine derived nutrients MDN's resulting in more benthic macroinvertebrates; resulting in better survival of young fish; and ultimately more returning fish – the feedback loop. These results are preliminary from one month of sampling so the overall results may change with completion of sample analysis. There is, however, one theory that may explain these results. The November sampling occurred just after the sockeye run. The large number of fish in the river may have dislodged the macroinvertebrates which were then flushed downstream. This is known as the 'carpet bomb effect'.

Conor mentioned that he would like the opportunity to present his final results to CFC after all the samples have been analyzed.

Thread: 8/0 Brown

Shuck: Brown Sparkle Yarn

Abdomen: Brown Super Fine Dubbing

Flag/Post: Cream Sparkle Yarn

Hackle: Grizzly

Thorax: Dark Hare's Ear Dubbing



The Hackle Stacker is an emerging mayfly pattern developed by Bob Quigley. Bob created this pattern to fool the picky fish in the clear waters of spring creeks. Although designed for slow moving water it is as much at home on the choppy water of the western freestone rivers. This version of the Hackle Stacker Flag is tied to represent a March Brown, but it can be tied to represent any number of mayfly species.
