March Program: Conor Giorgi, "Benthic macroinvertebrate response to spawning sockeye salmon in the White River, WA"

Conor Giorgi is an MS candidate at Eastern Washington University. He was the recipient of the Clearwater Fly Casters' 2013 Bill Alspach & Dave Engerbretson Memorial Scholarship. Conor will discuss results of his research in tonight's presentation.



My thesis research is designed to determine the factors limiting salmonid production in the upper Wenatchee River watershed. The current theory is that tributaries of the upper Wenatchee River (Nason Creek, the Chiwawa, White, and Little Wenatchee rivers) are nutrient limited and not producing the foodbase necessary to support healthy numbers of rearing anadromous fish. Historically these tributaries experienced prolific salmon runs. Returned adults and their carcasses brought large amounts of nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorous from the ocean to these rivers. As salmon populations have declined these nutrient inputs have also been dramatically reduced.

The goal of my research is to determine how salmon spawning effects the invertebrate community in terms of composition and production; which bugs make up the community and how much bug biomass is produced. To accomplish this I am estimating benthic invertebrate production in two reaches of the White River. The White River is the only stream of the four with a selfsustaining anadromous fishery; it is home to the largest run of sockeye salmon in Washington State. My study sites are upstream and downstream of the spawning reach, allowing me to assess the influence of spawning salmon. I will also sample invertebrates from the other three tributaries (Nason Creek, the Chiwawa and Little Wenatchee rivers) to determine densities in these streams and compare to densities observed in the White River,

In many aspects I take after my father (some fortunate, some less so), he is the one who introduced me to this illness. It all started when I was a wee lad, venturing to the streams on the west slope of Cascade Mountains for weekend sojourns. As my brother and I grew older my dad opened our fishing territory. Our weekend adventures still persisted but were now supplemented with annual

Backcast to January Meeting

President Roger Willemsen presided

Guests: No guests were present.

Fishing reports: Paul Agidius measured an 18" rainbow at Spring Valley. His measuring device was inaccurate, for the fish was only 15". Still a nice fish for Spring Valley!

Lynn Youngblood reported that he caught several perch 9" or smaller at Chacolet. His fellow ice fisherman caught a 39" northern pike weighing about 13 pounds.

Committee Reports:

Doug Baldwin, Conservation Chair, reported that the Elwha dam has been removed and the over fifty percent of Glines Canyon Dam has been removed. The Elwha River now flows freely from its headwaters in the Olympic Mountains to the Strait of Juan de Fuca for the first time in 100 years. Native chinook and steelhead are now going upstream to spawn The stated goal of the Elwha River dam removal is to restore healthy populations of *wild* salmon and steelhead to the watershed. Yet despite an overwhelming body of evidence confirming the harmful impacts of hatcheries, state, federal and tribal governments have agreed upon a plan that relies heavily on hatchery supplementation. Faced with the single greatest opportunity to restore wild salmon, they've opted for business as usual, perpetuating a failing paradigm of replacing native fish with a man-made alternative. Wild Fish Conservancy and other organizations have filed lawsuits against hatchery supplementation. Hook: TMC 200R size 8 to 14


Thread: Black 8/0 Shell Back: Peacock Herl

Body: Yellow or light green floss

Hackle: Brown

The Crackle Back is a very versatile fly that is a great attractor pattern that can be fished both as a nymph and a dry fly. We do not see this fly that often

in the west, but Ron Fisher of Billings, MT says that it is a popular fly back east. The fly was created by Ed Story of Feather Craft and can still be seen in their logo today.
