Scholarships:

Clearwater Fly Casters Scholarship in Collaboration with Kelly Creek Fly Casters

Four scholarship applications were received by the March 3rd cutoff date. Applications will be reviewed by the

Clearwater Fly Casters and the Kelly Creek Fly Casters for an opportunity to receive a scholarship from one of the clubs. Scholarship Awards will be announced at the April meeting of the club.

Back Cast:

Ethan Crawford, fisheries biologist for Washington Fish and Game, gave an informative program at our February meeting about the Asotin Creek Steelhead Assessment Project a 100% BPA funded resource program. He explained that between 200-1400 adult steelhead return to Asotin Creek in any given year. Ethan and his co-workers monitor fish passage both in and out of the tributary and collect critical data on fish trap efficiency and design, pit tag implants, tracking and distribution, with electronic data capture. His work is vital for steelhead recovery in the stream.

Minutes of the February Meeting submitted by Tony McDonnell:

- 1) We had a very small turn out of about 20 persons. Jared called the meeting to order and reminded us to continue looking for a vice-president candidate. New officers were installed by vote.
- 2) Cliff is on a resource advisory council for public lands and spoke of a recent Forest Service announcement of plans to increase campsite and cabin fees in the pan handle region from 40-200% in some cases. He plans to attend a March 19th meeting on the subject and seeks members' input. He mentioned that he has a lot of questions about this whole issue.

Fly of the Month: Trout Fin

Materials:

Hook: Dry Fly Hook

Thread: 6/0 waxed, White thread for all but the head,

black for head

Gold oval tinsel size small. Tag:

Tail: Duck quill fibers: white, black and orange.

Orange wool yarn. Body: Twisted gray wool yarn. Rib:

Hackle: Orange hackle.

Wing: Duck quill fibers: white, black and orange.

Head: Black thread.

Throughout the literature there are numerous versions of the Trout Fin. This version could be considered to be a combination of the Trout Fin and the Bergman Fontinalis. The origin of the pattern is somewhat questionable, but it appears Robert H. Cavanagh, Jr. developed the Trout Fin sometime in the 1920s. The Trout Fin was developed to imitate the fin from a Brook Trout, which was often cut off and used for bait.
