October 12th Program:

"Salmon Fishing on Kodiak Road System Rivers"

The Kodiak adventure began in 2002 and has continued annually, over the past 20 years, with very few missed years. e.g., 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. The idea of Kodiak and coho fishing was the brainchild of Andy Kleinhofs and

has continued to the present although participants have changed over the years, with yours truly being the only original participant still making the trip. Kodiak has a paved road system that provides access to numerous small rivers and streams, all of which have salmon including pinks, sockeye, chinook, chum and coho. We chose mid-September when the coho run was expected to be at its' peak. We wanted to experience coho fishing due to their reputation for taking flies readily and putting up spectacular fights which became readily apparent during our first trip to the island. We experienced some years where the coho were plentiful and some years where they were hard to come by. Over the years we mostly fished the Pasagshak river near the cabin we rented for our stay but had the option of driving a short distance to the Oldes river for another experience. At times we also fished the Buskin and American rivers, and Roslyn and Kalsin Creeks.

A variety of methods are used on the island to entice coho. We have mostly settled on a single fly that has proven effective over the years; however, some fishers have resorted to various spinners and spoons and some even to using bait under a bobber. Earlier runs of sockeye, chum and pinks have made fishing somewhat challenging due inevitable snagging of the spawned out and dying fish.

Accommodations on Kodiak are limited, but we were fortunate to have secured a place directly on our preferred

Pasagshak river. The cabin has everything needed and includes a fish cleaning station with a good freezer to preserve our catch for the trip home.

Travel to and from Kodiak is by Alaska Air which has improved their service over the years and now has easy connections to Kodiak and back to Pullman-Moscow.

Conservation Committee Report:

1. Small Mesh Gillnets are a Dismal Failure,

This year's spring <u>small mesh gillnet fishery</u> on the lower Columbia, that took place on May 23, was a dismal failure. Deceptively described as "selective" by misguided fisheries managers, this fishery proved that small mesh gillnets are anything but selective! Here are some facts about this 1-day commercial fishery:

1 out of every 100 fish captured was a hatchery Chinook, the target species.

A total of 48 salmonids were captured. Nearly two-thirds (60%) of the salmonids were discarded. The gear caught 9 different species of fish: Spring Chinook, Summer Chinook, Sockeye, Steelhead (including 2 kelts), White Sturgeon, Shad, Pikeminnow, Starry Flounder and Sucker.

Most embarrassing is that, despite the miserable failure of this gear type, fisheries managers in Washington advocated for additional fishing days. Fortunately, conservation and common sense won the day as ODFW was unwilling to agree with WDFW on additional days for this highly contentious and "risky" small mesh gillnet fishery.

2. Fisheries Managers Fail the Recreational Fishing Community Again,

The most popular recreational salmon fishery in the world was brought to a screeching halt this year, thanks in part to a failed management approach. Going into this season, fisheries managers knew that the limiting stock would once again be lower river Chinook, also known as Tules. During pre-season planning, approximately two-thirds of this limiting Tule stock was allocated to the commercial industry. While many of these fish were allocated to

commercial fisheries in Alaska and Canada, a whopping 23% of the impacts were allocated to the non-selective commercial troll fishery off the Washington and Oregon coasts. By comparison, the in-river recreational community, which produces a significantly higher economic value and with selective fishing, was allocated only 19% of the impacts.

Until our fisheries managers choose to prioritize conservation, selective fisheries, and economics, we will continue experiencing unnecessary closures and restrictions on recreational fisheries.

MATERIALS

Hook: Size 20 to 12, TMC 100, Mustad 94840 or similar

Thread: Beige or tan, 70 denier (6/0) in size
Tail: Whiting Tailing Pack fibers, ginger color
Wings: Large ginger feathers, looped Wonder Wings

Body: Tan muskrat dubbing

Hackle: Ginger Head: Thread
