
Everything St. Joe River. An exploration into the flora, fauna, people, and culture of the St Joe River Valley. Something of interest for everyone.

Conservation Committee Report:

Court Recommends Halting Alaska's Unsustainable Harvest to Protect Wild Chinook and Southern Resident Killer Whales

We are thrilled to share and celebrate with you the expected outcome of our court victory for the recovery of the Northwest's critically endangered Southern Resident orcas and the wild Chinook they depend on.

In a massive international and coast-wide decision for wild Chinook and Southern Resident killer whale recovery, Seattle's federal Court issued a landmark opinion on Tuesday that recommends terminating unsustainable commercial salmon harvest that has persisted for decades until new environmental reviews of those fisheries occur. That overfishing was found in a previous ruling to illegally harm the recovery of both endangered Southern Resident killer whales and wild Chinook salmon across the Pacific Northwest.

On Tuesday, U.S. Magistrate Judge Michelle Peterson issued a report and recommendation on Wild Fish Conservancy's lawsuit, agreeing that halting the summer and winter seasons of the Southeast Alaska Chinook troll fishery is the most appropriate remedy. Simultaneously, the judge found the federal government's inadequate biological opinion should be remanded back to NOAA in order for the agency to address violations of environmental law.

Scientists have identified lack of large and abundant Chinook salmon as the primary cause of the decline of the Southern Resident killer whale population.

"I want to emphasize that Alaskan fishers are not to blame for NOAA's chronic mismanagement of this fishery, and we are sympathetic to the burden this decision may pose on Southeast Alaskan communities," says Emma Helverson, Executive Director of Wild Fish Conservancy. "However, it's critical to also acknowledge that for decades this fishery has harvested majority non-Alaskan Chinook at unsustainable levels with cascading and coastwide consequences for fishing communities throughout British Columbia, Oregon, and Washington. In addition to the unparalleled benefits to killer whale and Chinook recovery, the Court's decision will restore more control to communities over the recovery of their local Chinook salmon populations, particularly tribal people, and First Nations."

"Despite the clear evidence, for too long government agencies, certifiers, and the media have been unwilling to acknowledge and address the unsustainable salmon harvest in this fishery and others that is harming the recovery of the Southern Resident killer whales and the wild Chinook they depend on," says Helverson. "The Court's finding is playing an important role in bringing science and policy closer together for the benefit of wild salmon, killer whales, and coastal communities."

In the coming months, the Magistrate Judge's report and recommendation and any objections from the defendants will be considered by the District Judge presiding over the case for a final ruling. Thank you to all our members, supporters, attorneys, staff, and colleagues who have helped to make this incredible decision possible.

Fly of the Month: "Wonder Wings Made Easy" Quick'n Easy Parachute

On a quick look at a looped Wonder Wing, you might think, "There is no way that "flimsy" hackle-fiber wing will support a parachute application." Believe us, it will after you learn to use the process we'll share in this chapter.

The Quick 'n Easy is a fly design Al developed in the early 90s after first learning about Wonder Wings. The parachute addition (above) came years later. It won't take you long to see why the fly got the name it has. It is a get-it-tied and on-the-water pattern for sure!

Note to the readers: Many readers (including us) tend to review the pictures on how to tie a fly and given our experience level, we are able to glean the fly-tying



information the author is presenting. If you do that with this pattern, you have a very **high probability** of **failing**. Please check the **pictures** AND the **text** carefully for each step. The fly is easy to tie but does have some steps difficult to capture in a non-motion photograph. The text is there to help explain what's happening in the photograph.

MATERIALS

Hook: Size 20 to 10, TMC 100, Mustad 94840 or similar

Thread: Tan, 70 denier (6/0) in size

Tail: Waste from the wings, ginger, or color of choice **Wings:** Large ginger feathers, looped Wonder Wings

Body: Tan muskrat dubbing **Hackle:** Ginger, parachute style

Head: Thread
